

Seal & Repair Potential Entry Points

Small gaps & openings around your home can provide access for insects, spiders, rodents & other pests. Regularly checking & repairing these areas can help keep pests outside where they belong.

What You Can Do:

- ☐ **Check around doors & windows** for gaps, damaged seals, or worn weatherstripping.
- ☐ **Repair or replace** damaged door sweeps & weatherstripping.
- ☐ **Seal gaps** around pipes, utility lines, vents, cables & other penetrations through walls.
- ☐ **Check** where the foundation meets walls, siding, or other building materials for visible openings.
- ☐ **Repair damaged screens** on windows, doors, vents & other openings.
- ☐ **Check garages & other exterior doors** for gaps, especially along the bottom and sides.
- ☐ **Inspect the roofline, eaves, soffits & vents** for openings or damaged materials when safely accessible.

Don't Overlook:

Pests can enter through surprisingly small openings. A gap that seems insignificant to you may provide an easy entry point for insects or rodents.

Sealing potential entry points helps reduce pest access & supports the effectiveness of professional pest treatments.

What to Expect:

Exclusion is an important part of long-term pest management. Regularly inspect your home for new gaps or damage, especially after storms, construction, or other repairs.
